Each fall and each spring, Do Something gives grants of \$500 each to ten young people who submit creative proposals for solving local problems. An applicant must be 25 years old or younger on May 1, 2006 to receive a 2006 Do Something grant. Applicant must have a mentor to apply for a grant. A mentor can be a friend, relative, teacher, coach, or anyone 18 years old or older who is willing to help the applicant with their project. Applicants may apply for grant either individually, or on behalf of a group or team.

The project is part of continuing efforts to identify, cross or challenge social boundaries.

The National Gardening Association supports school garden programs that use the garden to teach about nutrition and the issue of hunger in the United States. To be eligible for the 2006 Healthy Sprouts Awards, a school or organization must plan to

garden in 2007 with at least fifteen children between the ages of 3 and 18. The selection of winners is based on the demonstrated relationship between the garden program and nutrition and hunger issues in the United States. The program will present awards to twenty-five schools or organizations. Each will receive a \$200 gift certificate to Gardener's Supply Company; a literature and curriculum package from NGA; and NGA Supporter benefits for one year.

Save Our History

A program of the History Channel , Save Our History is a national history education and preservation initiative that seeks to raise awareness and support for preserving local heritage. Save Our History offers grants to history organizations to fund partnerships with schools or youth groups on community preservation projects. History organizations, including museums, historical societies, preservation organizations, archives, libraries, and government agencies, can partner on projects with a school district, a coalition of schools, one school, or an organization that provides educational programming for children. In 2006, the History Channel will award \$250,000 in Save Our History grants. History organizations can apply for up to \$10,000.
